
For his part, Rogan enjoys his life, but feels like something important is missing. He is

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Quiz the Minister



Question:

In Leviticus 27, the Lord set the value of a man 20 years old — 60 years old, at 50 shekels and a woman of the same age span only 30 shekels? Also, in Lev. 12:1-5 God says a woman is unclean for 7 days after giving birth to a boy, but unclean for 14 days if she has a girl and can be purified after 33 days for a boy and 66 days for a girl. Doesn't the Lord consider a female as valuable as a male? I thought we are all created equal in God's eyes.

Answer:

Wow, thanks NT for a great question! There are certainly a lot of contemporary issues wrapped up in what we see here. Gender and equality is a very big concern in our culture. I want to draw a distinct division between our culture today in the U.S. versus the ancient Israelites in the Middle East.

Almost every culture during the time period that Leviticus was written, and especially in the geographic

area, had a very patriarchal vibe. So much so, that indeed amongst the people, men were valued more than women. Men were seen as the providers and women were seen as the ones who needed to be taken care of. Sons were desired and daughters were accepted. Women had very low status and rights, in a culture that was ruled by men. In today's world this has changed somewhat, but we still see it in many places. (Now, I say that in terms of how people relate to people as in the cultural norm, not as how God sees people).

I think when you are asking the question of value, you are also asking about worth. Is a woman worth as much as a man? To God, absolutely yes. Please allow me to help dissect some of what we see happening.

The world, by and large, at the time we are looking at, was unapologetically patriarchal. Today, we live in a world that is striving against that system. A world that is looking to create equality amongst sexes. In some ways that has happened, in some ways it hasn't.

When we read back into the Bible, we always tend to read ourselves into it. What I mean is that we take our backgrounds, our experiences, our life with us as we read, and so we interpret what we read through our lenses. If we were reading the same pages a few hundred years ago, we might not even stop to ponder why men and women were treated differently. It simply was the way things were. That doesn't make it right or wrong, it simply was how the world was. I'm afraid I don't have the space to go through the exact context of both of these passages you bring up, but, in fact, there are many, many, passages that address the same question you are asking.

What I DO want to express, is that when God spoke to people in the Bible, it was always through a language and norms that they could understand. This treating of women as inferior to men in the Old Testament would not have been considered odd or demoralizing. It would have been as normal as anything else they knew. It had been that way since "the Fall". But, and this is a big but, when Jesus came, He put into play a treatment of women that was unseen and unheard of for the time. In many ways, Jesus set into motion a return to equality that hadn't been seen since Genesis 1.

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Quiz the Minister Continued...

Jesus spoke with women (very taboo for a man to do); He taught women, He healed women, and He often honored women over men. If you look at many stories in the gospels, women were treated kindly while men in the same periscope were scolded (the story of the woman who anointed Jesus' feet comes to mind; Matt: 26, Mark 14, Luke 7, & John 12). Jesus had female followers and that was a big deal. The Pharisees and Sadducees of the time had followers, but you had to be male, and Jewish, to be one. Jesus called women, slaves, gentiles, anyone who was marginalized in the societies at the time. Jesus pushed His treatment of women well beyond the expectations of many, and frankly caught some heat for it from the culture around him

For my thought, Jesus is God, and if God in the flesh treated women and men with equal honor; if Jesus showed no partiality for men over women, then His actions teach that He valued women the same as men. That equality would continue into today's world, challenging many of the accepted patriarchal norms that had been the status quo for thousands of years until the life of Christ. If the laws of Leviticus were just that, the law, then we have been brought out of that by Christ. I conclude with an affirming verse from Galatians.

23Now before faith came, we were held captive under the law, imprisoned until the coming faith would be revealed. 24So then, the law was our guardian until Christ came, in order that we might be justified by faith. 25But now that faith has come, we are no longer under a guardian, 26for in Christ Jesus you are all sons of God, through faith. 27For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ. 28There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave⁹ nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. 29And if you are Christ's, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to promise.


Vacation Bible School!

Tana Alumbaugh will share the journey to Tanelle: a God-led adventure in adoption






We will be collecting a free will offering for Lutheran Social Services, the agency that was a Godsend for Tana and Tason as He brought Tanelle to their loving arms.

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Sometimes "I Don't Know" is the Right Answer

We hate to admit when we don't know something. Whether it's parents to their kids, teachers to a student, or as a Christian to our non-believing friends. We like to think that we have all the answers, but sometimes we simply hit a spot where our knowledge is lacking. My daughter (who is 4) asked the perpetual "why?" question. I'm pretty good about getting the facts out to a point, but inevitably I hit a wall where I don't know any more. My default response is "because God made it that way". That's usually followed again by "why?" and then I laugh and change the subject or give her a cookie to forget the question:)

Unfortunately, my answer is isn't really an answer, it's a defense technique. I really don't know the answer to whatever the question may be, but instead of saying "I don't know", I hide behind God. Now, at the root of all our answers is God, so don't get me wrong. But when we are engaged in actual, real-life discussions with our peers who don't believe in God, that answer finds itself lacking. I was recently talking with a few atheists and the number one thing they said that makes them not take Christians seriously, is when they get to the point where Christians don't know the answer they respond with, "Well, it just takes faith." That's a frustrating answer. If you are person who wishes to engage in a real discussion with a Christian about real issues, and are given an answer to which you can't go any further with, it makes the whole conversation feel moot. Faith is vital for us Christians, but it shouldn't be a trump card that we play when we simply don't know something. I think a more appropriate response would be, "I don't know the answer to that. That's where I need to have faith." Even that small admission of our human weakness alongside the sovereignty of God, speaks more authenticity to the non-believer. In my conversation with said atheists, a number of issues came up regarding religion and the world, religion and science, religion and sexuality. My answer in many of these exchanges was; "I don't know, that's something I don't have a lot of experience with", or "I don't know, I wrestle with that question myself", or "I don't know. I know that Scripture says this, and I take it on faith to be truth".

Faith alone is great for the believer, but when we engage with those who don't have faith like we do it doesn't work to tell them that they just need to have faith. Sometimes, if we want them to explore Christianity further, then we admit when we don't know something (I mean we are all human, aren't we?). If we expect others to admit that they don't have all the answers as humans, then we as humans also need to admit the same, the difference being, we know where to point them to the answers.

Debt Free in Three

On March 1, 2015, Lake Superior Christian Church refinanced our mortgage. Thanks to the sale of our old building on Oakridge, we were able to put a substantial amount towards the reduction of our debt. We have just signed a three year note for \$431,676.45. For most of us this sounds like a lot of money and it is, but look at what we've accomplished. Originally on March 1, 2002, we signed a note for a mortgage of \$1,430,669.23. That means in the past 13 years we have paid off almost a *million dollars*!!!

Before we order the cake and punch for our celebration, we should discuss a few details. The elders have agreed to continue an aggressive monthly payment of \$9600. Continuing this payment will leave us with a balance of about \$122,000 at the end of our three year term (March 1, 2018).

We look forward to the day when the building will be paid off. It is our goal to arrive on March 1, 2018, with no remaining mortgage balance. By paying off the debt early, we can save on the additional interest a longer term loan will cost us and give us the satisfaction of complete ownership. We ask you to look to God in prayer and see if you could be a part of completely erasing this debt within the next three years.

We understand there are some that are financially strapped and aren't able to give any more at this time. We also know there are many of us who can give extra and we ask that you prayerfully consider this. As well, there are some who are financially blessed and we ask you to consider giving generously. If God has placed on your heart to help LSCC become debt free, please specify your additional financial gifts are to be designated to the mortgage.

In our zest to become debt free, please remember we continue to utilize your normal weekly giving to further the kingdom of God in Marquette County and the surrounding areas. Simply reallocating your normal weekly giving to the mortgage will cause financial deficiencies in other areas. Please consider giving additional monies towards the mortgage.

We are very excited to think how close we are to being debt free. For those of us who have attended Financial Peace University, we know Dave Ramsey would be pleased.
