Letters from Jesus Part 2

In last month's newsletter I began divulging some of the insights I've gained from a recent study I did on the book of Revelation. Using Dr. David Jeremiah's book, *Escape the coming night*, we looked at the first three churches that Jesus spoke to through the Apostle John. This month I want to continue with the final four churches: Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea.

Thyatira was a city that was located on one of the busiest trade routes in Asia Minor, so it was a very "blue collar" and "salt of the earth" type of culture that thrived off commerce and trading. The church was commended by Jesus as being hard-working, loving, loyal, and having great patience and maturing faith. Her good characteristics sound much like some of our churches today. However, she had a fatal flaw, tolerating sexual immorality.

We hear more and more in the news every year about churches and certain denominations doing this exact thing. Whether it's condoning homosexuality and gay marriage or allowing someone that is living an explicitly immoral lifestyle to serve and even lead, we tolerate under the umbrella of "loving" others or "being socially and politically correct". Jesus called the woman (or group of people) openly practicing sexual immorality in the church at Thyatira "Jezebel", referring to the evil wife of King Ahab, who worshipped foreign gods and brought in false priests and prophetesses as part of a cult that used sexual practices as worship.

Jesus gave three different messages to the church. The first to the person/people practicing the immoral behavior, He called for judgment if there was no repentance. As I mentioned in the first newsletter, the churches in Revelation also parallel the universal church in history. I think that this call to the immoral behavior slipping in could also refer to the church of the Middle (Dark) Ages, when it accomplished little for Christ because it sought to concubine Christianity with the pagan practices of the age, thereby committing spiritual immorality. The next message was to the Christians at Thyatira that didn't follow the immoral practices. Jesus spares them from any additional burdens and says "keep it simple". Sometimes we tend to multiply rules upon rules in Christianity instead of just serving God and loving people, which Jesus said was the greatest command. The final message was for the overcomers to remain faithful and not give in.

The next church that received Jesus' attention was the church at Sardis. Jesus begins His words to this body of believers with words of denunciation rather than commendation, saying, "You have a name that you are alive, but you are dead." He was saying the church was more of a mausoleum than a church, a well-kept place filled with dead men's bones. This is a repeated notion in God's people throughout scripture. Isaiah pointed out people that drew near with their lips, but their hearts were far from God and Jesus spoke to the Pharisees about their nominal belief and hypocrisy. The church in Sardis was like a religion that never got past the infant stage and grew to maturity in Christ. Jesus gives direction to this church by saying, "Wake up before you loose even what little you have left". To the true believers He gives encouragement to keep pressing on even when it seems those in leadership are spiritually dead, to be a church filled with the Holy Spirit, and to become pure and holy. Many churches today are dying and losing any hope of being a godly witness to the on-looking world. Churches don't die because of outside enemies, by totally renouncing Christ or truth, or because God abandons them. They die because each individual has allowed compromise; because we rely on overconfidence in who we used to be, and because we are not sensitive to our spiritual conditions. Dr Jeremiah says, "Christians don't lose their salvation, but their lives can so grieve the Holy Spirit that there is no life, no power, and no vibrancy. When most people in a church do that, there is no life left in that church. Every Christian should look at his or her own life as a barometer of the life of the church. As the members go, so eventually will go the church."

The church at Philadelphia was called the faithful church, a church that pleased the Lord not because of how many members it had, how big the building was, or the size of the budget; it was a church that loved well. From the perspective of church history, the church at Philadelphia represents the period from the beginning of the 19th century to the rapture, or what we might call the revived church. Especially early on, this part of church history represents a time of great missionary outreach, revivals, and the advent of the Christian education movement. It is the Philadelphian church that will be in existence in some form when Christ returns. Jesus tells this church that there is an open door or opportunity to do great ministry. He says they have a little strength left so they will need help from the Holy Spirit to bridge the weaknesses they have. They have kept the word and not denied the Lord. Dr. Jeremiah says, "Many church growth experts have identified the characteristics of the Philadelphia church as characteristics of growing congregations: identification of open doors for ministry, dependence on God for strength, commitment to the Word, and submission to the Lordship of Christ." To this church, Jesus made the promises to take down their enemies, keep them from the hour of trial, and a quick return. This is the type of church I pray we can be or are becoming here at LSCC; that we not only bring, build, and send people, but that we are totally in love with God and so sold out to Him that we can't help proclaiming what He's done for us in Jesus!!

As much as I wish I didn't have to conclude with this, it serves as a warning for us to beware not to close the door in Jesus' face by becoming too comfortable. I am speaking, of course, of the Laodicean church, which Jesus diagnoses as compromising, conceited, and Christ-less.

The heart of mankind is described in three different ways in the New Testament. The disciples on the Emmaus road had a burning heart. Matthew 24:12 speaks of a cold heart, and here in Revelation 3:16, Jesus finds this church possessing a "lukewarm" heart. A lukewarm Christian compromises his/her faith, is afraid to stand for anything, or offend anyone. Sadly, there are many Laodicean-like churches in Christendom today trying to please people but displeasing God and duplicating the world at the expense of truth.

The Laodicean church believed they were rich when they were poor, spiritually speaking. Because Laodicea was a very wealthy city, there was an air of materialistic pride that had slipped into the church. We see the same thing happening in our world today as church leaders boast of bigger buildings, vying for influence and control in politics, and competing with the Jones's to have the best of everything and be the coolest church around. David Wilkerson, author of, *The Cross and the Switchblade* says, "... God is not impressed with the church's bloated estimate of itself. The lukewarm church is not destined to dominion, power, and authority of any kind. It is destined for judgment. For nearly 2000 years the church of Jesus Christ has been rejected and persecuted by the world. Am I now to believe that Jesus has changed His mind and decided to close out the ages with a lukewarm, rich, pampered, boastful, self-centered church? Will the last army of God consist of precinct workers getting out the vote? Will the soul-winners be replaced with petitioners going into the highways and hedges seeking signatures for some social cause? No, Jesus calls it, poor, wretched, about to be forever cut off, naked and shameful, blind, and the object of His wrath."

These are poinient and scary words to hear from our Saviors lips. May we ever be seeking to have the burning hearts of the disciples on the Emmaus road and have a fire in our souls that can't be quenched or contained. I pray that we can be on our guard against attitudes and beliefs that mirror the world's and take us away from Jesus' call to die to ourselves, take up our crosses, and be prepared for trials. Please pray with me that Jesus is pleased with us individually and as a corporate body...that we never give in or out...that we can be assured to hear Him say well done. Enter into eternal rest.
